Prize Giving ceremony



We were proud to welcome Rebecca Wright '93 as speaker at our annual Prize Giving ceremony at Chester Cathedral.

Rebecca spoke warmly about her time at School and engagingly about her life since leaving. Following Queen's, her passion for literature took her to Oxford followed by a doctorate and spell at Harvard studying law before a career as an

international human rights lawyer and a UK criminal barrister.

She spoke from the heart both in the Cathedral and earlier in School to a group of aspiring lawyers about her own role models, about failure and how it is a necessary part of life and about the importance of self-belief and standing one's ground.



Of particular note was the first presentation, to **Zoe Thornton-Reid '18**, of the Brina Marks Prize, a beautifully crafted box designed in memory of Brina to contain the accumulating stories of the contributions to the world of the girls who receive it.



Girls' from 1968 return to school after 50 years, as well as large groups from 1978 and 1988, all keen to catch up with old friends, share memories and tour the school.



- Miss Shirley Hayes on 17th August 2018. Shirley was a pupil in the post-war years and then returned as a young teacher of Domestic Science. Her main domain was the ground floor of the Science Block, which had been built in the 60s. Here she taught cookery to generations of girls. Needlework, especially lace-making, was her passion and after she left Queen's, she continued to teach lace. As Domestic Science changed to Home Economics, she also taught girls to think about budgeting for a household which she considered a very pertinent skill.
- Josephine Klein '44 on 13th November 2018. Leading psychotherapist who was always grateful for the support given which enabled her to attend The Queen's School as a young refugee.
- Miss Daphne Luff, peacefully, aged 89 years, on 4th July 2018. The Queen's School is very grateful for Miss Luff's generous donation to The Bursary Fund which will help benefit future generations of girls.

The Queen's School Commemoration

Alumni Officer Clare Holland (Witter) '88 gave the following speech to the congregation:

"

Almost exactly one hundred and forty years ago, on May 1st 1878, not very far away from here at a house on Lower Watergate Street, a nervous new headmistress, Miss Constance Holdich, opened the doors of our school for the very first time.

Almost forty years ago, in September 1978, again not so very far away, in a house on the Liverpool Road, a nervous new pupil, wearing a rather itchy red knitted hat, walked through the doors of our school for the very first time.

In those early days, Miss Holdich was apparently "much impressed by the docility of Chester girls in comparison with (the) London girls" she had taught previously. I'm not sure that being docile is a trait we encourage in Queen's girls nowadays, but at least it meant that our first headmistress apparently never had any trouble with the children! (I'm not sure I never gave any trouble - but I don't think it was too much!)

Now here we are in 2018, and those I've just mentioned are only two of a number of special occurrences, both global and Queen's, that occurred in years ending in 8. Hung up in the Nave there, that many of you can see, are photo reminders of a huge event. 1918 marked of course the end of the four years of the First World War, during which the girls of The Queen's School had apparently all contributed to the war effort, with activities as diverse as picking sphagnum moss for hospital use (apparently it's a bog moss which, dried, was used for millions of wound dressings) knitting socks and stitching sandbags. Knitting, sewing and other "domestic sciences" (as they were

called in my day) were for decades a principal part of the education at Queen's. But learning to thread a sewing machine was a skill I could just never get to grips with - and remembering receiving a smack (albeit in jest) for getting it wrong for the umpteenth time makes me realise just how much times have changed!

In 1928 the Equal Franchise Act was passed (giving women voting rights equal to men's) and The Queen's School celebrated its fiftieth anniversary. For that there was a week of celebrations in May - a jubilee bazaar (which I think sounds rather like a giant jumble sale); a morning of school sports; a special dinner; a peal of the Cathedral bells and a special service, with those Queen's girls then sitting right here where you Queen's girls are now. Bearing in mind that in 1928, as well as the special service in May, The Queen's School also held its Commemoration Service in October, you might be thinking that two services are rather too much of a good thing! But cathedral services are a part of Queen's, girls, and they will stay with you. You might be rather surprised to hear that in my final year at school, then called the Upper Sixth, I chose not to accompany my parents and siblings on a flight to Australia but stay and participate in the Senior Choir in my last Cathedral Christmas Service as a Queen's girl. I don't sing up there on the raised seats any more but I still find it difficult not to sing the descants to the carols!

The Diamond Jubilee - sixty years of The Queen's School - was celebrated in 1938, with all the excitement and events of 1928, but with a garden party as well. I know that a garden party has become a very attractive tradition at the Lower School, but my memories of cake eaten at the right-hand half of the Lower School which was then Nedham House, are not quite so genteel. Some of the congregation might remember the frequent power cuts of the 1970s - and one such cut meant only partial cooking of our favourite lunchtime chocolate sponge. The gooey mixture was put outside the kitchen door in buckets, intended no doubt, for the pigs. But maybe you can imagine what a horde of little girls did - it was the ultimate in licking the bowl! We had to apologise to Mrs Ogg for our behaviour - but it seemed very odd to be asked to apologise to a cook for enjoying her food!

1948 was another special year for Queen's as it was in January that year that Nedham House was opened, named after the fourth headmistress. In 1968 the building of the swimming pool was started (but that of course was the old pool, now replaced.) When I started at the Queen's junior school (in our centenary year) lessons only went on until 12.20pm on a Friday until, in Form II, we received the coveted, hand-written invitation from Miss Whitnall to stay for lunch and 'Activities.' This was a whole new world of exciting crafts and games, from baking (always




honeycomb crisp) to Binca (that's cross-stitch fabric out of which we made decorated covers for our GNBs - General Note Books) and gardening (our own squares of earth) to pottery (I wonder if the kiln is still in the cellar?)

You'll remember that forty years ago I was that nervous new pupil in the red knitted hat. These hats were home-made, with only the pattern and a description of the wool colour provided by school. So you can imagine the variation in our appearance when we were all together! As we all know, mothers have a wide range of skill-sets and I'm not sure my mum's was knitting!

Anyway, ten years later, in 1988, I left The Queen's School, little appreciating then the education I had received. I do appreciate it now. And that's partly because I have two fantastic daily reminders of the qualities and standard of our amazing school. So much is different in their teenage years from the 1980s, but being Queen's girls, Isobel and Caroline remind me of the constants: the essential hopes, fears and aspirations of intelligent, educated girls remain the same.

And in my role as Alumni Officer I've met many former Queen's girls of all ages, shapes and sizes, but this notion of us all being instilled with shared values is a constant. As Lesley Cooke, last year's alumna speaker reminded us, "You will always be a part of Queen's and, more importantly, Queen's will always be a part of you."

2018 is of course a special year. We're celebrating one hundred and forty years; my Queen's contemporaries and I are meeting again to reiterate and refresh our friendships - so many of which have stood the test of time; and you Year I3 students are this year's Queen's alumnae with '18 after your names. And in 2028, when you Year 3 ladies are here, participating in this Commemoration Service as seventeen and eighteen year-olds, I'm sure you'll have fond memories of this and so many other aspects of your school life and be proud, as I am, to be a Queen's girl.



From the Headmistress

I am proud to lead a school with such energy and where value is placed on each and every girl.

The girls excelled themselves last academic year and our plan is obviously to ensure this excellent standard continues - with a firm emphasis on critical and independent thought. Prizes and exam results are important but they are only part of the journey - and that journey continues well beyond Queen's.

It is the development of the whole person which I believe will ensure our pupils achieve real and long-lasting success in their lives.

Preparing girls for life is one of our particular strengths here at Queen's and with such a warm and vibrant Queen's community, further strengthening the connections the girls have with our alumni is something I am passionate about. It is only too clear that our alumni, too, want to support current pupils.

The power of role models cannot be underestimated in a school, especially if they also have a strong connection. You will have read that in December we hosted 'Oxbridge Life', and it is this first-hand knowledge from girls who only a few years ago were sitting where our current students are now, that is of such value; your very presence inspires and motivates the girls.

Being able to share news of alumni successes is always powerful and we are currently working to build up our stock of alumni career case studies to enable our girls to be able to see the paths those before them have taken in whatever caree

area they are seeking to progress. We love to share real life experiences that the girls can relate to as the journeys travelled, literal and otherwise, by our former pupils enrich the entire school.

I am keen to provide an environment for the girls which encourages them to recognise they are the influencers of the future. We must strive to nurture the development of each girl into a strong, independent woman fully prepared for challenges lying ahead.

International Women's Day in March has provided an ideal opportunity for me to launch a new project - a high-tech virtual board room with full conferencing facilities - which will open in September. This facility will enable the girls to gain experience of running a project or business idea from start to finish. We are currently building links with successful women, worldwide, both within and beyond our alumni who would like to be involved as a team advisor. The boardroom will provide for each team to link with their advisor, ideally for an hour each month to present and talk through a report covering all aspects of the project - conceptual, financial, marketing, sales etc. The meetings will also allow opportunity for self-reflection and critical analysis of strengths, weaknesses, success and failure. The aim of the project is for these teams of girls to learn how to create a business

present ideas, learn listening skills, consider body-language and develop assertiveness.

It was pleasing to see from our recent parents' survey that the careers advice Queen's provides was judged 'very high'. Interestingly, the pupil survey confirms the younger girls are especially interested in gaining more insight into potential career paths. I therefore want to extend and widen our range of speakers and external mentors and if you feel this is something you would like to get involved with please do get in touch via the Alumni Office. I have enjoyed meeting some of you already, and look forward to meeting many more of you in the months and years to come.
