THE CHRONICLE, 1941-42.

1941.

Saturday, September 13th.

Eight of the VIth Form Girls had the privilege of representing the Queen's School at the special service held in the Cathedral to celebrate the fourth centenary of the founding of the Diocese of Chester. The sermon was preached by William Temple, Archbishop of York, now Archbishop of Canterbury.

Wednesday, September 17th.

The school re-opened for the Autumn term. During the Summer holiday Miss Buchanan had joined the W.A.A.F., so was not able to return to us. Also during August our second English mistress, Miss Pearson, was married and returned to us as Mrs. Colyer.

Thursday, October 16th.

At the meeting of the Governors the question of school accommodation was discussed. It was decided that owing to the increase in the number of day-girls it was no longer possible to reserve rooms for the use of boarders. With regret it was decided to close the boarding house at the end of the Autumn term.

Thursday, December 4th.

Mr. Sergeant gave an interesting talk on China and the Burma Road to the Senior girls.

Friday, December 19th.

The Autumn term ended and the boarding house was closed. We had to say good-bye to Miss Dickie, who was joining her sisters in London, and to several of the boarders.

1942.

Tuesday, January 13th.

The Spring Term began.

Miss E. C. Williams joined the Staff in the place of Mrs. Colyer who left at Christmas.

Friday, January 16th.

Miss Margaret Haig and Mrs. Gertrude Treda gave a lecture-recital on "Music, Poetry and Costume through the Centuries."

Tuesday, January 27th.

Flight-Officer Swift came and spoke to Forms VI and V Upper on the work of the "Women's Auxiliary Air Force."

Tuesday, February 10th.

Miss Barlow and Miss Stansfield gave a short concert with piano and 'cello. By such concerts in schools and colleges they had already raised £1,200 for Mrs. Churchill's Red Cross and Aid to Russia Fund. As the result of a silver collection we were able to give £6. 10s. towards this fund.

Monday, March 2nd.

For a fortnight from March 2nd, a full and interesting training course was held at the school for women who were preparing to work in War-time Nurseries and Nursery Schools. Our Art-room and other rooms were used for this purpose. Twenty-six trainees attended the course. and many of them are now doing useful War-work.

Wednesday, March 4th.

Confirmation in the Cathedral by The Dean, Bishop Norman Tubbs, who had prepared the Queen's School candidates.

Thursday, March 5th.

Party for Forms IV Lower A. & B. and IV Upper A. & B.

Friday, March 6th.

Party for Forms V Lower, V Upper and VI.

Both the above were in connection with the Warship week in Chester, held from March 7th to 14th. The sum saved through the Queen's School amounted to £2,433. 15s.

Tuesday March 31st.

End of Spring Term.

Wednesday, April 29th.

Summer Term began.

Monday May 4th.

The new War-time scheme for school dinners was introduced. In spite of difficulties we now provide over 200 dinners a day.

Thursday, May 14th.

The Reverend P. J. Heaton spoke to the Vth and VIth Forms on Mission work in India. Mrs. Goldney also gave a short account of some of her experiences among Indian women.

Wednesday, May 27th.

The Prize Giving was held at the school. Mrs. Brown presided, and the prizes were distributed by the Rev. B. A. Hardy, Head Master of the Cathedral Choir School.

Friday, May 29th.

Mrs. Wise (an old Q.S. girl, Dorothy Owen) spoke to the Senior Girls about careers, taking into account special War-time conditions.

Thursday, June 4th.

Mr. Hesketh Hubbard gave a delightful illustrated lecture on Pictorial Design. We were grateful for the use of the lecture theatre at the Grosvenor Museum and for the use of the lantern.

Tuesday, June 16th.

A meeting for the parents of boys and girls in the Chester Secondary Schools was held in the Town Hall. An address on the subject of Religion in the Home and School was given by Miss Phyllis Dent, Lecturer to the National Society (The Central Council of the Church of England for Religious Education). The Chair was taken by the Rev. G. Thomas, former President of the Free Church Council.

A similar meeting has been arranged for Friday, July 31st, at 7-30 p.m., in the Town Hall, when the speaker will be The Very Rev. W. R. Matthews, K.C.V.O., D.D., Dean of St. Paul's Cathedral. The Chair will be taken by The Deputy Mayor, Councillor Kate Clarke.

1942.

THE CHRONICLE, 1943-44.

—1943.

At the end of the Summer Term, 1943, we had to say goodbye to Miss Buckle who was leaving us after 22 years' service in the School. With quiet efficiency she had entered fully into the life of the School, and is being greatly missed. Many girls will remember her keen interest in the School Fiction Library which grew so much under her care that twice it had to be moved to larger quarters. The Fiction Library continues to flourish under the guidance of Miss Hicks and Miss Maggs, with the ready help of the Prefects.

Wednesday, September 15th.

In the Autumn Term the School was overful even though many girls had been refused admittance. Miss Buckle's place was taken by Mrs. Parker, and it has been a great help to us to have Miss Ayrton and Miss Whittam as full-time members of the Staff.

Wednesday, October 6th.

The Merseyside String Orchestra, Conductor Mr. Louis Cohen, gave the third Concert of the Secondary Schools Music Club at the City Grammar School.

Thursday, October 14th.

Senior Commandant Williams, accompanied by Colonel Boyd Rochfort, showed a second A.T.S. film to some of the Senior girls. We were grateful for the use of the Grosvenor Museum on that occasion.

Friday, October 15th.

The School Harvest Festival was held. Girls brought large quantities of flowers, vegetables, eggs and jam, and after our Prayers and Thanksgivings these were carried over to the Royal Infirmary.

Monday, October 15th.

Miss Myra Franklin came and told us something of her work in an Indian Mission School.

Tuesday, November 23rd.

Bishop Tubbs, the Dean of Chester, came and talked to the whole School about China and the debt we owe to her as our Ally in this war.

Friday, December 17th.

The Autumn Term ended and twenty-four Senior girls began work in the Post Office as voluntary helpers in the Christmas Post.

1944.

Monday, January 31st.

The Senior girls from the Queen's School joined with others from the City High School at a meeting at the Grosvenor Museum. Our friend Senior Commander Williams who was married in December and had become Senior Commander Wilkinson, had arranged for us a demonstration by a Parachutist. We were all interested in the complicated equipment necessary.

Thursday, February 3rd.

The Merseyside Orchestra gave the fourth of the Secondary Schools' Music Club Concerts at the City Grammar School.

Friday, February 18th.

The Prize Giving was held at the School. Mrs. Brown presided, Canon Jarman led the Prayers, and the Prizes were distributed by Dr. W. H. Grace.

Sunday, February 27th.

Fifty-six St. John Cadets joined in the General Inspection at the Drill Hall by the Superintendent-in-Chief, Lady Louis Mountbatten, C.B.E.

Saturday, March 11th.

Queen's School Choirs entered for two sections of the Non-Competitive Music Festival arranged by the Music Committee of the Rural Community Council of Cheshire, and held in the Refectory. The Director, Dr. Sydney Northcote, Music Advisor to the Carnegie Trust, gave interesting and appreciative criticisms.

Friday and Saturday, March 17th and 18th.

Girls from the Upper Vth and VIth Forms joined, by kind invitation of Mr. Baty, in a conference held in the Town Hall. The subject of the Conference was "The Problem of the East Central European Countries," and there were interesting speakers from Poland, and Czecho-Slovakia. The Conference was attended by large numbers of boys and girls from schools in Chester and North Wales.

Friday, March 24th.

Major Basil Nield, Member of Parliament for Chester, gave an interesting talk to the Senior girls on the History and Customs of the House of Commons.

Saturday, March 25th.

A large number of girls from the Middle and Upper School attended a film performance to which they were invited by Chester's Film Society.

Wednesday, March 29th.

A Confirmation in the Cathedral was taken by Bishop Tubbs. The candidates from the Queen's School had been prepared by Canon Jarman.

April 18th—25th.

In the Easter holidays, Miss Gee, with Miss Homewood, Miss Wood and Mrs. Merchant, again took a party of VI Form girls on an expedition to the Lake District. This party consisted of 19 girls.

Thursday and Friday, May 4th and 5th.

Parties were arranged by Miss Wood and Miss Homewood for the girls in Forms I to Form Remove. These entertainments had special reference to the "Salute the Soldier Week," held in Chester from May 6th—13th.

Friday, May 5th.

The Queen's School held a Commemoration Service in the Cathedral, the first since the beginning of the war. The Preacher was the Rev. Canon W. S. Coad, Canon Residentiary of Chester Cathedral, and we were glad that so many parents, old girls and friends of the School joined in the Service.

Sunday, May 21st.

Sixty of our St. John Cadets joined in the Cathedral Service, and took part in the Parade on Empire Youth Sunday.

Monday, May 22nd.

Girls from the Senior School went to the City Grammar School to hear an instructive and inspiring talk entitled "Britain and America: Joint Partners in To-morrow's Task."

Tuesday and Wednesday, June 6th and 7th.

We had the great pleasure of welcoming many Parents to the School on these two afternoons. There was a short Programme of Music after which the visitors were taken round the School by the girls. When the dates for these Open Days were fixed we did not know that they would coincide with the opening days of our Invasion of Europe, and therefore be of great historic interest.

Thursday, June 15th.

Mr. Hesketh Hubbard gave us another of his interesting lectures on Art. This time his subject was Caricature.

Saturday, July 1st.

At the time of writing this Chronicle we are looking forward to the Old Girls' meeting to be held on this day.

1944.
